



# Problems addressed by the research project


- The near abandonment of Cree healing practices and practitioners;

- Traditional knowledge/language is being lost;
- Applying the ABS regime in the field;

#### **Population**

- 15,000 Eeyouch (Cree)
- 9 communities
- 4 communities involved in research project
- 2 new communities

### **Actions by the Cree Nation of Mistissini**


#### **Resolution summer 1999**

- secure funding to document use of Eeyou medicines;
- ensure safety issues in relation to use of Eeyou medicines;
- promote the use of Eeyou medicines
- promote the transfer of knowledge about Eeyou medicines
- **Summer of 2003**: support from the Elder Chief and 18 other Elders for the first ethnobotanical study in Mistissini


### An ethical approach

- Improve human health : no profit-driven or pharmaceutical companies involved
- Follow CIHR Guidelines for Health Research involving Aboriginal People including notably:
  - Respect for Cree culture and knowledge
  - Transparency about the project with Cree communities
  - Sharing ideas and knowledge (Central role of Elders)
    Steering committee = Cree + Academics
  - Handling plants and their habitats with care (e.g. sacred aspect; impact assessment; sustainable development)
  - Apply human research ethics (e.g. Prior Informed Consent PIC)
  - Protection of Aboriginal Traditional Knowledge and related Intellectual Property
- Respect Access and Benefit Sharing (ABS) principles (Convention on Biodiversity)

### Collaborative research

- Regular meetings
- Planification stage
- Review of publications
- Reports to communities
- Acknowledgement of Elders in publications
- Involved in all stages
- Booklets/posters, herbarium specimens
- Training/apprenticeship
- Help in establishing local TM clinics
