



Part 1. Disseminate Best Practices Through Cities' and Organizations Network

Natureparif, the city of Montpelier, the city of Paris, the association of mayors of French big cities, the French committee of IUCN, with the support of the CBD, have create a network of local government to promote and disseminate good practices in favor of biodiversity though case examples. This brochure aims to encourage policy makers and elected representatives and is designed as arguments on urban ecosystem services. Part 2. French Biodiversity Monitoring Citizen Science Program Vigie-Nature (i.e. Nature look-out)

This initiative consists in 14 distinct programs lead by the Natural History Museum in cooperation with naturalists NGOs and Nature Conservation NGOs, and grouped under the banner "Vigie-Nature". Biodiversity monitoring is addressed through species groups such as common birds, bats, butterflies, dragonflies or terrestrial snails or via functional groups such as pollinators. All together it generates some 15-45 scientific publications per year. More importantly, results are widely used as biodiversity indicators, both at continental, national and local level. http://vigienature.mnhn.fr

Part 3. Red Lists at the Regional Level

Red Lists on plants and animals have been elaborated at a regional level to catalogue and highlight those that are facing a higher risk of global extinction. Thus, regional Red Lists are used as a tool of communication at the regional level in order to address biodiversity issues and assess local interests. The Red Lists are then compatible with CBI Index of Singapore. Locally, Red Lists are also used to produce biodiversity indicators such as assessing proportion of threatened species among main habitats or life history traits. ICCAs in South and East Asia and their role in achieving Aichi Biodiversity Targets

Kalpavriksh in collaboration with ICCA Consortium and Foundation for Ecological Security (FES) hosts a workshop on issues of Community Conserved Areas (CCAs) in South Asia, focusing on the opportunities and threats faced by these spaces. CCAs are ecosystems that are voluntarily conserved by the local communities through customary laws or other effective means. While South and East Asia have engaged with this form of conservation for centuries; recognition of this work, in both the national and international arena, has only recently begun. In the Indian context, the government of India has recognised CCAs as potential forms of conservation in the Wild Life Act (as Community Reserves), the Forest Rights Act (as Community Forest Resources), the 11th 5-year plan (200712), the National Biodiversity Action Plan (2008), the National Mission for Green India (2010), and other policy documents. It is being widely recognized that CCAs have a great potential to help achieve the CBD Aichi Targets, especially Target 11 on protected areas. The workshop will focus mainly on mechanisms for recognition of CCAs, determining the position of CCAs with reference to protected areas, recognition of tenure and access rights, the balance of rights, powers and functions of local people and government bodies in determining the governance structure of the CCA and changes in the legal domain of CCAs, at national and the international level, since the last regional workshop in 2009.

Communities in Nature: State of Protected Areas Management in the Philippines

Introduction by Ms. Jamison Ervin, UNDP GEF
Presentation by Ms. Mundita S. Lim, Director of the Protected Areas and
Wildlife Bureau (PAWB) of the Department of Environment and Natural
Resources (DENR)

After twenty years of the National Protected Areas System law, the Philippines is taking stock of its conservation record, documenting and consolidating the lessons learned to ensure that the next generation of resource managers has a baseline to refer to in their effort to address future challenges. This report is the first attempt to share to the public, in a candid and transparent manner, the state of protected areas management, highlighting successes and challenges and presenting summary data. The report draws insights and lessons from the evolution of conservation policies and programs throughout history and through NIPAS implementation to guide future programs and to encourage broad stakeholder support in these programs.

The Philippines is known for its pioneering environmental conservation framework that is community focused, and where decision making is participatory and multi-sectorial. This is a reflection of the fact that in the Philippines, communities are so closely linked to the environment. Thus, this report is dedicated to, and entitled "Communities in Nature" to emphasize the connection.

Furthermore, this introduction is intended to provide useful information especially for decision makers in provider country(ies) when they are required to revise or establish new institutions: 1) an option value and multiple benefits available through sustainable utilisation of genetic resources including those by alleviation of other environmental problems; 2) nonmonetary benefits that are available through ABS mechanisms including capacity building, technology transfer, and filling up investment gaps; and 3) framework to evaluate cost-effectiveness of options for ABS related institutions when they are considered, responding to ratification of the protocol.

The ABS Capacity Development Initiative – a multi donor partnership - promotes and supports the implementation of the 3rd goal of the CBD in Africa, the Caribbean and the Pacific by involving actors from local communities over business and research to administration and policy makers. Already prior to the adoption of the Nagoya protocol the ABS-Initiative has taken up several CEPA Experts meetings in cooperation with SCBD, UNEP and IUCN CEC. The goal: to develop appropriate approaches to communicate target group specific the complex mechanism of ABS – and it's win-win opportunities for users and providers of genetic resources. In order to support countries in the current "hot" phase of Nagoya Protocol ratification and national policy development the ABS Initiative and its partners have intensified its CEPA work and developed a CEPA guide for ABS implementers, a short animated video on the basics of ABS and as well as the 30 mins film "People, Plants and Profits" illustrating 3 bioprospecting cases in Africa in the context of the Nagoya Protocol. Equator Prize winners demonstrate this through: peer-to-peer learning exchanges, the use of project sites as centers of excellence, the deployment of extension officers and extension services, the use of culturally appropriate communications strategies, innovative usage of media and technology, the establishment of knowledge networks, participatory needs assessments, and the engagement of youth and children. This reception brings together ten representatives from Equator Prize winning communities to present their work in each of these areas of grassroots communications, education and public awareness innovation. Stations will be set up for communities to present in a rapid-fire, rotating, interactive format. Drinks and light food provided.

1. Be a Scientist for a Day: A citizen science project for biodiversity surveys at BNHS Nature Reserve (BNR)

The BNHS Nature Reserve situated in Mumbai is a 33 acres forested land. In 2011, "Be a Scientist for a Day", a citizen science project was launched wherein the year-long

biodiversity surveys were carried out by involving 254 amateurs and experts. Every month surveys were held for five themes viz. Plants, Insects, Moths, Herpetofauna and Birds. The feedback by the participants revealed that more than 80 % of the participants found the programme to be effective. The presentation will deal with this case study of citizen science.

2. The Role of Natural History e-groups in Bridging the Gap Between Scientist and Citizens and their Contribution to Conservation of Indian Wildlife

There are several e-groups on natural history in India largely composed of amateurs, but also experts, both national and international, who provide interesting data from far and wide areas of India. This makes these e-groups a powerhouse of natural history information. While the interactions are taking place on almost daily basis on some e-groups, no study has been carried out about the impact of this modern age science study method. The presentation covers the achievements of these e-groups and the perception of the moderators, experts and members.
