#### **GYBN** is



- **Global platform** of youth organizations and individuals working on **Biodiversity**
- Aims to to raise global awareness among young people of the values of biodiversity
- Facilitate action plans for **youth advocacy** and **empowerment**;
- **Build capacity** to enable youth to be **change agents** on both the national and international level
- ✓ Coordination platform for youth participation in the CBD process;























# History

- ✓ Idea to estalish youth network was discussed at numerous youth confernces between 2008 and 2010
- ✓ Interim Steering Committee coordinated establishment process from 2010 to 2012
- ✓ GYBN Kick-Off Meeting in Berlin in August 2012:
  - √ 40 representatives of youth organizations from 20 countries
  - ✓ funded by Germany, hosted by NAJU
- Adoption of GYBN Statute and establishment of the network






























#### **GYBN Members**

- ✓ 51 member organizations, representing **341.000** members from **86 countries**
- √ 800 subscribers of our GYBN mailing list
- ✓ over 2.100 fans on our facebook page
- ✓ International Steering Committee (12 members – all continents)

























### **Activities**

- ✓ Support and coordinate youth participation in the CBD Process
  - ✓ Fundraising
  - ✓ Liaison with CBD Secretariat and other organizations
  - ✓ Organize actions and campaigns
- ✓ Awareness raising, Capacity building and education
  - ✓ Prepare youth for international negotiation processes
  - ✓ keep youth informed on CBD issues





# <u>Decision XI/8. "Engagement of other stakeholders,</u> major groups and subnational authorities"

- 1) Acknowledgement of the importance of youth participation
- 2) Encourages parties to fully involve youth in all relevant processes
- 3) Invites parties to continue to provide support for youth initiatives that support the three objectives of the conventions

#### **GYBN Achievements**

- ✓ Coordination of Youth Participation at COP11
- ✓ Governments of Sweden, Spain and Colombia invited GYBN to represent youth at Key-Biodiversity Meetings in 2012 and 2013
- ✓ Initiation of Partnership with Korean youth for COP12
- ✓ Coordination of fundraising activities for COP12
- ✓ First Youth Delegation to CBD intersessional meeting SBSTTA-18 and WGRI-5 2014
- ✓ Coordination of Youth Participation at COP12
- ✓ Coordination of Youth Input to IUCN World Parks Congress



## Youth Participation at COP12

- ✓ 36 youth delegates at COP12 in Korea
- ✓ Youth Capacity-Building Seminar
- ✓ 5 Interventions so far
- √ 5 Youth Side Events



# Youth Participation in the CBD

- ✓ Host country is usually represented in large numbers
  - → But number of host country youth typically decreases at next COP: e.g. 20 japanese youth at COP10, only 1 at COP11
- ✓ Key Magediverse countries (e.g. Colombia, Malaysia etc.) were not or poorly represented at COP11
- ✓ Lack of youth delegates from countries of both the Global South and the North



















# **Participation Figures**

- √ Various World Regions remain underrepresented
  - ✓ Europe (except of Germany at COP11, 1 at COP10)
  - ✓ Africa (2 at COP11, 2 at COP10)
  - ✓ South-America (1 at COP11, 1 at COP10)
  - ✓ Central America (o at COP11, 1 at COP10)
  - ✓ Western Asia (none)
  - ✓ Eastern Asia (2 at COP11, 20 at COP10)
  - ✓ Australia (none)























# **Main Challenges**

- ✓ Many youth organizations and young people in the world are involve in on-ground nature conservation projects
- ✓ Youth organizations are mostly active on the local or national level
- ✓ Very few engage on the international level due to:
  - ✓ lack of capacity due to national and on the ground work
  - ✓ lack of knowledge about the importance of the CBD and how to participate effectively
  - ✓ lack of dedicated funding for youth participation in Biodiversity governance



## **Next Steps**

- ✓ Mobilize our community and connect the network
- ✓ **Capacity building** Spread the knowledge of the international CBD-Process
- ✓ Create dialogues with the national/local process, identifying gaps in the implementation
- ✓ Concrete **contributions** to the implementation of Strategic plans, achievement of Aichi targets.






















- ✓ Further connect young people and organizations, raise awareness and mobilize people




















