- Integration of biodiversity into formal and non-formal education is key to the creation of future generations of citizens and managers

CEPA: The challenge for the Contracting Parties, and organizations involved in the Convention, is to develop effective communication to stimulate a change in those practices that act against biodiversity conservation and the wise use of natural resources. To be effective, the Contracting Parties need to first engage stakeholders in defining the issues and possible solutions. In this consultation the role of communication and education is assessed as well as the need for it to support appropriate legal and economic instruments that can bring about change. This means that CEPA should form a central part of implementing the Convention by each Contracting Party.

What can India do? Considering COP-11, India can focus on the following

- (a) Discussing and finalizing national CEPA strategies and their contribution to implementation;
- (b) Mobilization of the media for communication of messages on the importance of biodiversity for human well-being and of the Convention and its objectives;
- (c) Integration of biodiversity considerations into education including formal and informal contexts, and inter alia primary, secondary, university, and professional training;
- (d) Best practices in raising public awareness, including communicating with stakeholders and major groups, including business and other important economic sectors.
