CBD Agenda

The UN Convention on Biological Diversity (**CBD**) was adopted in 1992 at the UN Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro. WWF and IUCN played a key part in its origin. Today, 190 states plus the European Union are signatory states of the Convention, which is binding under international law, and have accordingly committed themselves to three goals:

- the preservation of the wealth of animal and plant species, habitats and genetic diversity
- their sustainable use and
- the fair sharing of the profits and benefits resulting from this use.

The parties come together every two years for the conference of signatory states (Conference of the Parties, **COP**) to discuss the goals of the Convention – as for example in 2002 at COP 6, when CBD resolved to bring about a considerable reduction in the extinction of species around the world by

2010. This so-called "**2010 goal**" was confirmed by the World Summit on Sustainable Development (WSSD) in Johannesburg in 2002.

Major themes at this year's Conference of the Parties are

- Protection of forests
- The setting-up of terrestrial and marine protected areas and their funding
- Implementation of the agreement and attainment of the 2010 goal
- Assessment of the ecosystem approach in terms of experience acquired so far
- Global strategy on plant protection
- Extraneous species as a threat to biological diversity
- Preservation of plant and animal genetic diversity in agriculture and
- Incentives for conservation and sustainable development



COP for Newcomers

COP 9 will be held from 19 to 30 May in the Maritim Hotel in Bonn, immediately after the fourth meeting of the Cartagena Protocol (**MOP 4**, 12 to 18 May). From that time on, Germany will assume the chairmanship of CBD for the next two years until COP 10 in Japan. The conference of the signatory states is the highest decision-making body of the Convention. During these two weeks, in a general assembly as well as in two working groups running in parallel, votes are taken (see programme section, pp. 16 to 29). As all decisions have to be taken unanimously, the working groups are accompanied by a large number of informal meetings.

Particular importance is also attached to the **High-Level Ministerial Segment**, taking place from 28 to 30 May in the World Conference Center Bonn (WCCB). The ministerial meeting is intended to provide solutions to problems that were not able to be resolved in the course of the conference.

In addition, the Ministerial Segment will be a forum for specific contributions from individual parties or groups who want to play a part in realising the 2010 goal.

The many different **Side Events** have also come to be an important integral part of the conferences. These information events reflect the wide diversity of CBD. Here technical experts mingle with decision-makers. WWF offers Side Events covering several of the main topics of CBD.

In addition, under the title "**Plaza of Diversity**", a biodiversity fair is taking place directly next to the Conference Center. Here there will be an opportunity to establish a dialogue with experts as well as our "nature witnesses" in the WWF Pavilion.



CBD Glossary

ABS: Access and Benefit Sharing – denotes access to and fair sharing of the benefits resulting from the use of genetic resources.

CHM: Clearing House Mechanism – platform for information exchange.

Contact Group: Informal committee convened by the plenary session of a working group to discuss particularly delicate topics.

Ecosystem Approach: Strategy for the integrated management of natural resources, serves as a methodical basis for the implementation of CBD.

Friends of the Chair: Small group brought into being by the chairman to sort out disagreements in the discussions.

GEF: Global Environment Facility – a financing instrument of CBD.

GSPC: Global Strategy for Plant Conservation – consists of 16 specific goals for protecting the plants in five action areas.

NBSAP: National biodiversity strategies and action plans (in accordance with Art. 6 of CBD).

Programme of Work on Forest Diversity: Adopted in 2002 at COP 6; defines a set of 12 goals, 27 topics and 130 activities designed to achieve the three goals of CBD.

Programme of Work on Protected Areas: Adopted in 2004 at COP 7; extensive, effectively managed and ecologically representative protected area systems are due to be set up by 2010 for terrestrial, and by 2012 for marine areas.

SBSTTA: Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice – advisory scientific body.



User Guide to Germany

Meticulous, orderly and slightly pedantic – Germans like to take things seriously. That's why you should always have the right answer to hand when someone from Bonn asks you in the underground railway: "By 2010 Germany will be protecting so many million hectares – what's the situation in your country?" You're sure to be welcomed by passersby with the words: "While you're here, how many billions worth of investment in conservation has your country signed up for?" or "Do you know how many days there are till 2010?"

Don't worry though, Germans can also broach less weighty subjects. To engage in relaxed small talk you should in any event be fluent in the following: eating, eating and drinking beer, eating and drinking wine, drinking wine and beer. So that sporting activities don't come off badly compared to eating, Germans like watching soccer. And, especially in the region of Germany you're visiting now, celebrating and

carnival are a vital part of life. On the last days of carnival – this is no joke – men have their ties cut off by women who are complete strangers. During the Conference, though, you can wear your tie without fear – Germans prefer to celebrate carnival when it's cold and wet outside.

If, however, you don't want to attract attention to your outfit, but prefer to immerse yourself fully in German culture, you should wear Lederhosen, carry a cuckoo clock and yodel bravely from time to time. If you get stared at by Germans in disbelief and they say to you: "Typically German", then maybe you've done something wrong after all...



For a living planet – the WWF

The World Wide Fund For Nature (WWF) is one of the largest independent conservation organizations in the world, with almost five million supporters, and is active in more than 100 countries. 59 national sections, programme offices and partner organizations collaborate within the global network of WWF.

The growth of WWF is a success story with many chapters: the giant panda, the Siberian tiger and the Java rhinos have survived. From the rainforests of the tropics to the Himalayas, from the European river meadows to Madagascar, from the Danube to the Amur, from the Wadden Sea to the South Seas, hundreds of projects demonstrate the courageous commitment of scientists and conservationists of WWF. In over four decades of hard work WWF can point to more than 300 protected areas and over two million square kilometres of protected nature.

In order to preserve biological diversity, however, strong political commitment is also required. This conference in Germany – the last COP before the decisive 2010 landmark – must not remain fruitless. Substantial new funds are necessary for the implementation of the Convention. A yawning funding gap exists, running into billions. The loss of natural forests must finally be stopped and a breakthrough achieved too in the discussions on an international agreement regulating access to genetic resources and fair benefit sharing.





The COP 9 Key Issues

Biodiversity underpins the health of the planet and has a direct relationship with human well-being providing food security, water, medicine as well as mitigating climate change and natural disasters. Therefore governments need to make the protection and sustainable use of biodiversity a political priority. WWF is concerned because indicators show that the global community is not on track to meet the 2010 Biodiversity Target. The Convention is not being effectively implemented.

However, Environmental Ministries cannot meet the 2010 Biodiversity Target on their own and will need the support of additional sectors of government, especially those sectors which depend on biodiversity including agriculture, fisheries, water, and health.

In addition, increased integration of climate change con-

cerns into the CBD, and conversely, integration of the CBD's objectives into the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change as well as the processes of other Multilateral Environmental Agreements is fundamental if the 2010 Target is to be met. Otherwise conservation gains will be minimal and continually threatened by climate change.

WWF calls on Parties to ensure that COP 9 makes progress in the following five key areas:

 Mainstream Biodiversity. Governments should develop joint biodiversity protection implementation plans between environment, agriculture, food, water, finance, health and cross cutting climate ministries in order to take urgent action to reduce the rate of biodiversity loss by 2010.

- 2) Protected Areas. Because of its strong targets and timelines the Programme of Work on Protected Areas is the most effective instrument under the Convention for achieving the 2010 Biodiversity Target. Governments need to live up to their commitment to put in place effective protected area systems, integrated into surrounding landscapes, with the full and effective participation of indigenous and local communities and promoting equity and benefit sharing. Governments should prioritize the protection of areas that are important for food security, water supply, medicine and disaster mitigation as well as ensuring their resistance and resilience to climate change.
- **3) Finance.** Implementing the CBD will require financing and COP 9 needs to adopt an innovative Resource Mobilization Strategy that fosters new commitments from all Parties to

- mobilize additional resources from international and domestic sources as well as by developing innovative financing mechanisms. The strategy should have concrete funding targets and timelines and include a mechanism to effectively monitor implementation.
- 4) Climate change and biodiversity. Climate change concerns from mitigating green house gas emissions to adapting to an ever changing climate cut across all sectors, societies and ecosystems. The international community has committed resources for climate change adaptation and to Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and forest Degradation (REDD). Both REDD and adaptation initiatives, if effectively designed, can clearly benefit biodiversity conservation as well as indigenous peoples and local communities. Much investment is likely to be allocated to REDD projects and adaptation in the near future. Substantial efforts must ensure

projects benefit biodiversity, local communities and tackle climate change. COP 9 should call on CBD and UNFCCC to develop a Joint Work Programme to identify and highlight the critical role of biodiversity in mitigating and adapting to climate change. This work should be lead by a CBD/UNFCCC Joint Working Group.

5) Sharing benefits. At COP 8 in 2006 the CBD Parties committed themselves to negotiating an international regime on access to and benefit sharing from the use of genetic resources by 2010. For this target to be reached there will need to be substantial progress made at COP 9.

Did you know that the beaks of some humming birds only fit in certain flowers? This ensures that the pollen from one plant is passed on to the right kind of flower. However, this lock and key principle is very sensitive — if one species dies out, this will inevitably lead to the extinction of the other species.




