Biodiversity Outcomes Framework provides a means to connect plans and strategies to shared outcomes, assess progress & set priorities.



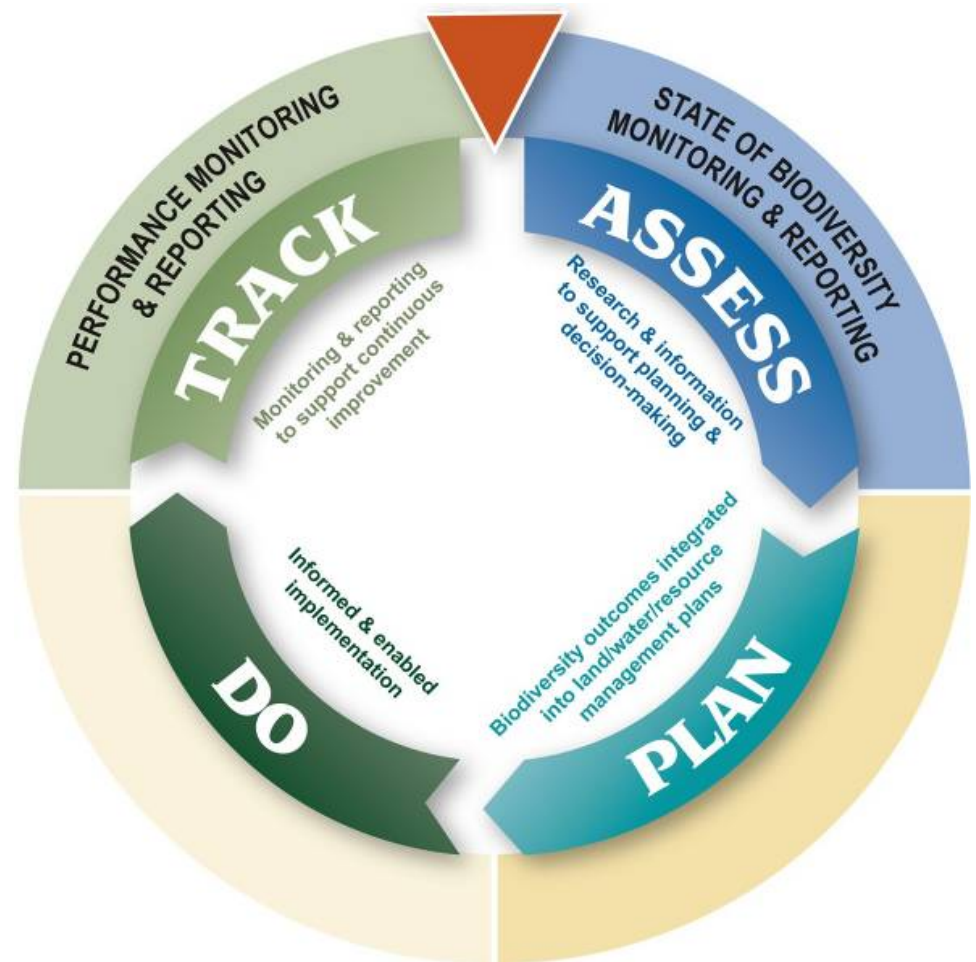
“How” – ecosystem approach & adaptive management used to achieve shared outcomes


