Canada's Report to the CBD on the International Year of Biodiversity

INTRODUCTION

The International Year of Biodiversity was a time to celebrate, reflect upon, and renew Canada's commitment to the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity.

Across Canada, federal, provincial and territorial governments, businesses, cities, conservation organizations and citizens participated in a wide range of activities to promote awareness of biodiversity and encourage actions to conserve it. Throughout 2010 biodiversity was profiled and celebrated in green schools, on stages, in art displays, in company and community events.

While there is still much work to be done to reduce biodiversity loss, 2010 provided an opportunity to reach out to the many groups and individuals who can make a difference, to create new partnerships, recognize the many accomplishments and plan for the future. On the heels of International Year of Biodiversity, the United Nations General Assembly has designated 2011-2020 as the UN Decade on Biodiversity. In Canada and internationally, efforts to increase awareness of the importance of biodiversity and ecosystem services, and to conserve biodiversity and use biological resources in a sustainable manner will continue to grow.

The following report profiles the many events, reports (including the first assessment of Canada's biodiversity from an ecosystem perspective), programs, websites and communications and education initiatives undertaken by Canadians to promote and celebrate the International Year of Biodiversity.

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EVENTS

May 13-15, 2009

4th Regional Center of Expertise (RCE) on Education for Sustainable Development (UNU) International meeting

The Montreal RCE-UNU welcomed 150 delegates from 35 countries at Environment Canada's Biosphère for the 4th Regional Center of Expertise (RCE) on Education for Sustainable Development (UNU) and international meeting. A world class panel on Education for Sustainable Development and emerging issues, including biodiversity, was presented. The slogan and logo for the year, made possible thanks to the financial support of the Government of Canada, were unveiled at the ceremony, attended by representatives of three levels of government and the diplomatic corps. The launch was hosted by Mayor Gerald Tremblay of Montreal, with the participation of the Minister of Sustainable Development, Environment and Parks, Quebec, Madame Line Beauchamp, Jean Langlais, Director of Environment Canada's Biosphere museum, and the diplomatic corps accredited in Montreal.

Paradis perdu, a program at the crossroads of theatre, cinema and the performing arts, was created by Dominic Champagne, Jean Lemire and Daniel Bélanger. The storyline of the show focused on the recreation of the world as a beautiful garden where humanity could live in harmony with nature. The show was produced in collaboration between Théâtre il va sans dire and Place des Arts.

Trans Canada Trail partners with Environment Canada in promoting International Year of Biodiversity

The Trans Canada Trail is the world's longest network of trails. When completed, the Trail will stretch 22,500 kilometres from the Atlantic to the Pacific to the Arctic Oceans, linking 1000 communities and 34 million Canadians. In partnership with Environment Canada, a "Biokit" will be developed to guide a biodiversity journey on the Trail. Also in collaboration with Environment Canada, video clips of the Trail were featured in the Hinterland Who's Who biodiversity series.

The report explores the state of Canadian taxonomy in three areas: taxonomic expertise, the state of biodiversity collections, and Canada's strength in data sharing. Back to our roots (Sept 2010 - May 2011)

Back to Our Roots, is an activity prepared by Environment Canada's Biosphere in conjunction with the Programme de soutien des écoles montréalaises. The program was launched in September 2010 and will run to May 2011. This 90 minutes activity allowed students to learn about biodiversity found in their own backyard. In a scavenger hunt through the gardens surrounding the Ecological House, students discovered garden critters that actually help our gardens grow. In the EcoLab, students learned about pollinators, their role in nature, problems they are facing and just how important they are to us. Lastly, through a matching game, students learned about composting - and how Nature is the world's best recycler. They discovered the different flora and fauna that help in this natural process and how to compost at home. May 22nd – June 2011 Beautiful Biodiversity Public Art Display

In the Northwest Territories, the International Year of Biodiversity was celebrated with vivid colours, a beautified construction site and a public art display.

In the spring of 2010, hundreds of school children participated in two painting extravaganzas hosted by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (ENR), Government of the Northwest Territories. On the International Day of Biological Diversity, families attended an event organised by the Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society. In June, the Canadian Department of Fisheries and Oceans coordinated a Rivers to Oceans education day for school children. At both events, ENR staff introduced the concept of biodiversity and its importance, and encouraged children to make choices to preserve it.

To help illustrate the concept, hundreds of wooden silhouettes, representing the biological diversity of the territory, were hand-painted and decorated by the children. Partnering with a local construction company, the brightly coloured fish, birds and insects were mounted on a covered sidewalk beside a construction site. A hand painted mural, complete with trees and sun, provided a home for these "animals" in their natural environment.

Located in downtown Yellowknife, this display is there for all residents to enjoy and to learn from, spreading the biodiversity message on an even larger scale. The Government of the Northwest Territories, Department of Environment and Natural Resources (Public Education) partnered with the following organizations in this initiative:

Clarke Builders (supplied the space on their construction site downtown Yellowknife) Ecole Sir John Franklin High School (tech students cut out the wooden silhouettes). Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society (hosted International Day of Biodiversity) Federal Department of Fisheries and Oceans (hosted Rivers to Oceans Day)

Because We Are Not Alone

A new program "Because We Are Not Alone" was launched by Environment Canada's Biosphere in 2010. Through this dynamic role-playing game, students discover how biodiversity can link people who may otherwise appear to be very distant from each other. Whether they play the role of an Asian fisherman or a European tourist, the players have to come together and find a common ground when faced with issues pertaining to biodiversity. The Circle of Life

The Circle of Life, a 90 minute biodiversity themed activity designed for groups of children aged 7 to 11, was launched by Environment Canada's Biosphere in 2010. The objective of this activity was for students to understand that every organism is linked to other species and to the ecosystem in which it lives. The activity is separated into three parts. In one activity, students learn to appreciate, through the role playing game "Survival", the interactions between species, their habitat, and outside factors. Through the hands-on activity, "Feathers and Feet", using 5 different bird specimens, students explore the different adaptations that birds have evolved to survive in different niches. Finally, through a photo rally students explore the beauty and wonder of Canadian biodiversity.

Montréal Biodiversity Centre

The Biodiversity Centre of the Université de Montréal was created thanks to the efforts of several researchers of the Institut de recherche en biologie végétale (IRBV). It is a centre of excellence in conservation and digitization of biological collections and in biodiversity research and training.

The new building of the Biodiversity Centre was designed according to the LEED green building standards and built in the heart of the Montréal Botanical Garden. A large portion of the building is dedicated to housing several important collections of plants, insects and fungi. The Centre's cutting edge laboratories gather about fifty researchers and students dedicated to the discovery and preservation of the natural heritage of Quebec, Canada and the world. Finally, the Centre also encourages the general public to learn more about biodiversity and biological collections by offering museum exhibits and activities in its exhibition hall.

Users of these two BioKits have the chance to share their discoveries online and evaluate the biodiversity of the places explored.

The City of Montréal BioKit features ten major parks on Montréal Island. Points of interest are highlighted, and their GPS coordinates can be captured on a GPS navigational device.

The Île Sainte-Hélène BioKit, features a GPS treasure hunt of the Island, located in the middle of the St. Lawrence River. Armed with a GPS or a map, participants explore the Biosphere's surroundings while looking for clues to the treasure chest of Pehr Kalm, one of the first botanists to explore the island's natural treasures.

Users of the Cap Tourmente Biokit can recreate the day of a 1729 shipwreck off the coast of Cap Tourmente, and set off to discover the wonders of the Cap Tourmente National Wildlife Area. Points of interest and geocaches can be found on the adventure using a GPS unit.
