Brief Description: The International Institute of Tropical Agriculture (IITA) partnered with World Agroforestry centre (ICRAF), National Museum of Tanzania, Wildlife Conservation Society of Tanzania (WCST) and Tanzania Biodiversity Information Facility (TanBIF) to organize an art competition 'Biodiversity is our life, use it well,' to mark the International Year of Biodiversity. The climax was the prize giving ceremony and exhibition launch held on May 22, the International Day of Biodiversity. The guest of honour at the event which brought together over 300 children from 30 primary schools in Dar es Salaam and their teachers was the Minister in the office of the vice president in charge of environment, Dr Batilda Burian.

The permanent exhibition will be at the National Museum and House of Culture, Dar es Salaam. Also from May 17 - 21, the team visited seven schools in Dar es Salaam and held interactive sessions with the students on biodiversity, its importance and why it should be conserved. Trees donated by the World Agroforestry Centre were distributed and planted in the schools.
